

Distaff Day

"Distaff Day, also called Roc Day, is 7 January, the day after the feast of the <u>Epiphany</u>. It is also known as Saint Distaff's Day, one of the many unofficial holidays in Catholic nations.

Many St. Distaff's Day gatherings were held, large and small, throughout local fiber community. The <u>distaff</u>, or rock, used in spinning was the medieval symbol of women's work. [1]

In many European cultural traditions, women resumed their household work after the <u>twelve days of Christmas</u>. Women of all classes would spend their evenings spinning on the wheel. During the day, they would carry a drop spindle with them. Spinning was the only means of turning raw wool, cotton or flax into thread, which could then be woven into cloth.

Men have their own way of celebrating this occasion; this is done through Plough Monday. It is the first Monday after <u>Epiphany</u> where men are supposed to get back to work.

Every few years, Distaff Day and Plough Monday falls on the same day. Often the men and women would play pranks on each other during this celebration, as was written by <u>Robert Herrick</u> in his poem "Saint Distaffs day, or the Morrow After Twelfth Day" which appears in his <u>Hesperides</u>.

Some modern craft groups have taken up the celebration of Distaff day as part of their New Year celebrations."

And you're invited to drop in any weekday afternoon, 1:00-5:00p starting Thursday, January 9th through Wednesday, January 29th at FAVA (the Firelands Association for the Visual Arts), 39 S. Main St., Oberlin. We're "Artists in Residence" in the first floor Main Gallery. Parking is available at the rear of the New Union Center of the Arts building. Handicap ramp is at the back door.

The Style Show and Exhibition Opening is Sunday, February 2nd at 1:00p sharp. Come see what rookie weavers design, weave and then sew over the month. The garments will be displayed in the South Gallery through Sunday, Feb. 9th. FAVA hours are 11:00-5:00p, Tuesday through Friday, 1:00-5:00p Saturday and Sunday.

Also at Oberlin College, in the Science Center (corner of W. Lorain and Woodland), first floor display case, is an exhibit titled "From Fleece to Garment". It will remain until mid-April to be replaced by an exhibit of Sue Copeland-Jones' surface design pieces, connected with Artist as Quiltmaker through July.

The meeting is every month on the last Sunday, from 1:30 to 4:00pm, at Huntington Township Hall. It is located on the southeast corner of the intersection of Routes 58 and 162. It provides a place for people to come and work on their fiber projects while talking about anything that comes to mind. Those who come really enjoy the relaxed atmosphere because there is no formal meeting involved. There is plenty of room for a lot of people. The windows are large and let in plenty of light. Bringing snacks to share is welcomed but not required. Entrance to the room is off the fire escape steps in the rear of the building, at the second floor level. There is also an elevator located on the north side of the building that opens directly into the room. The meeting is held every month unless it interferes with a holiday or township business.

Get ready for the 2014 LOCO Unfinished Fiber Projects Retreat

When: Feb 20 - 23, 2014

Where: The Milan Inn - See their website, (http://milaninn.net), for pictures and directions.

Cost: Depends on how many people stay each night. No daytime use allowed; overnight participants only. Estimate for 10 people staying 3 nights is around \$675. The Inn may give us a discount for multiple night stays.

What to bring: Snacks and beverages, we may decide to loosely organize a few meals so that we can sit together at the

large dining room table.

There is bedding enough for 12 people, but be forewarned that the Inn has only two bedrooms and two very nice bathrooms. They provide roll-out beds and airbeds that can be set up in the dining room and large living room. Who can participate: Until we know for certain how many people commit to the retreat, it will be closed to the LOCO membership only. If we have room for more fiber artists, then it will be offered to people outside of the LOCO membership, but that will be determined in January or early February. A deposit is required and is non-returnable. If you cannot come to the retreat, then you must find your own replacement. Partial payments will be required by dates to be determined, plan on making your total payment by Feb 1, 2014.
