#### **LOCO CHALLENGES: 2025-2026**

Fiber Bingo: See the next page or there will be a hard copy at the July meeting.

There are 24 activities you can participate in during the year: Use two different kinds of fiber; dye some fiber; create something that makes you happy; Design a project using monochromatic colors; design a holiday piece are some of the ideas on the card.

Choose as many squares as you want during the year. Any fiber craft is appropriate for the challenge. When you finish a project bring it in for show and tell or wait until April 2026 when you bring in your fiber bingo card.

Fiber Bingo cards will be available in June and then it will be included in July's newsletter.

Chain Reaction: We are also planning to bring back the Chain Reaction Challenge. Chain reaction is when 4 or 5 members make a team. The first member of each team receives an inspiration item and makes something using that item. (weaving, spinning, baskets, crochet, knit, beading) Then that item gets passed to the next person and that person is inspired by the project received. And so on and so on. #### Placemat Exchange Group:

<u>Summary of decisions made at the meeting for woven placemat</u> <u>exchange:</u>

Finished size of placemat 13.5 tall x 18 inches wide

Hems on short side (to the left and right as one sits at the table)

Hems to be woven with thinner yarn (10/2 or 16/2?); hems will be double rolled.

Colors: weaver's choice of 3 blues and optional minimal accent yarn of tan/linen color

Pattern is weavers choice but must be a twill draft

Weaving yarn is not required to be Brassard brand (i.e., Maysville is ok to use)

Number of placemats to be woven will be decided soon, depending on number of weavers involved. There may be two groups for the distribution at the exchange, which would require less placemats to be woven.

The exchange will be handled in such a way that hopefully no one should be left feeling like they didn't get as much of a choice as others.

It is acceptable to ask for advice and input from anyone else (such as sett, length of warp, amount of weft needed, etc.) hopefully not revealing too much about one's chosen draft and colors.

Reveal and exchange date to be in early to mid-Spring.

#### **LOCO Library**

Book review by Jean O: Crackle Simply by Susan Kesler-Simpson. Published by Stackpole Books

Crackle is a twill-based weave structure with great versatility. It was given its name by Mary Meigs Atwater, the woman who jump-started American craft weaving. Atwater looked at the way the threads separate and it reminded her of the cracks in pottery so she called the weave structure Crackle. Crackle is a block weave structure made up of four or more threading blocks. Each block has two primary threads and two secondary threads. Warp threads called "incidentals" must be added when needed to keep the proper twill sequence. Part of what makes the structure so versatile is that the blocks can be enlarged, reduced or even moved. In addition, there are many ways to play with color through the warp or with the primary and secondary weft threads.

Simpson does an exceptional job of explaining how a weave structure works and the ways in which a weaver can work with it to create. She has included 27 projects, both modern and traditional, that are simple enough for a beginning weaver including shawls, scarves, rugs, blankets, towels, and table runners. She also introduces treadling variations showing that crackle can be woven as overshot, summer and winter, and more opening up a world of additional possibilities.
