Loco Library Corner

New in the LOCO Library at Ginko Gallery in Oberlin is Color Works published in 2004 by Interweave Press. It is Deb Menz's response to all her students across the country who have repeatedly requested this book. Not the usual book about color that tries to explain relationships with charts and squares or circles of color, the book illustrates what color does in allsorts of fiber media. Hue, value, shades, proportions, harmony, undertones and many more properties of color are all explained with photos of quilts, embroidery, knitting, beading, weaving and etc. As Menz writes on page 82,"Understanding what affects color in the mediums that you want to use will enable you to make choices that will give more predictable results." 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Knitting tips

When knitting cables, use a round toothpick as an auxiliary needle to hold stitches at the front or the back. Round toothpicks are long enough and, if one is too sharp, blunt it with an emery file.

For beginners When using a pattern that has multiple sizes, make a photocopy of the pattern. Circle the variables for the size you are making. Red ink works well! When knitting the pattern, it's easy to spot the circled number and avoid mistakes. Using a copy of the original pattern keeps the original unmarked in case you want to make it again in a different size for someone else

If your bound off edges tend to be tighter than your knitted rows and draw in, bind off using a needle several sizes larger than the needle size used to knit the work.

Measure! If you're working on the cuff of a sleeve, and need exactly 4 inches, say, count the number of rows it takes to reach the length you want. Then make a note on your pattern. When you're working on the second sleeve you know you have to knit exactly that many rows to complete your measurement.. This method will prevent a knitter desperate to finish from

stretching the work even a little to achieve the length needed.

A single bale of cotton can produce 21,960 handkerchiefs, 4,321 mid-calf socks, 2,419 pairs of jockey shorts or 1,200 t-shirts. It could also be used for 3,000 diapers, 200 sheets, 1,200 pillow cases or 750 terrycloth bath towels. It will make 875 blouses, 750 dress shirts, 350 dress or 300 pairs of jeans.

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
