There will be discussion of how many and what kind (woven or knitted, etc) they should be There is still wool from the fleece the guild bought in 2006 so bring your spinning wheel to start producing the yarn.


The money raised is donated to the Heifer Fund which provides fiber animals to needy people around the world. In 2006 the guild raised more than \$1,000 for 'knitting baskets' of sheep, alpacas and rabbits.

There will also be discussion of plants for the dye garden that was so successful last year at the Bacon House in the Metroparks.

Volunteers willing to knit or crochet a shawl should think about what they would like to create so colors can be provided.

Three of Betsy's students at Oberlin have each produced a lovely hand-dyed and handwoven scarf, thanks to yarn dyed at the January program: Amy Caes (purple -- yes add, more fuchsia), Maude Richards (blues with a hint of fuchsia) and Rachel Stowers (blues and turquoise) And Amy is nearly finished with an original knit toque, too.



(cast on a multiple of 11 sts. Sample has 33 stitches.)

Row 1 (RS) *Yo, ssk, k9; rep from * to end.

Row 2 and all WS rows Purl.

Row 3 *K1, yo, ssk, k8; rep from * to end.

Row 5 *K2, yo, ssk, k4, k2tog, yo, k1; rep from * to end.

Row 7 *K3, yo, ssk, k2, k2tog, yo, k2; rep from * to end.

Row 9 *K6, k2tog, yo, k3; rep from * to

Row 11 *K5, k2tog, yo, k4; rep from * to end.

Row 12 Purl.

Rep rows 1-12.

By-laws changes

Lorain County Spinners & Weavers Guild (LOCO) Guild By-Laws

Article I - Name

The name of the Guild shall be the Lorain County Spinners and Weavers Guild. (Also known as LOCO Spinners and Weavers.)

Article II - Mission Statement

Our Guild is formed to promote friendship and understanding among its members. And to assist members in the pursuit of spinning, weaving and fiber art through education, discussion, and programs. And to share their crafts through demonstrations in our community.

NEW replace above with: The mission of the Guild is three-fold: 1) to promote friendship and understanding among its members; 2) to assist members in the pursuit of spinning, weaving and fiber art through education, discussion and programs; and 3) to share their crafts through demonstrations in our community.

Article III - Officers and Duties

Section I- The elected officers of the guild shall be President, Secretary and Treasurer.
Volunteer positions on the board shall be Historian, Newsletter Editor, Demonstration, Sunshine, Public Relations, Refreshments and Samples.

NEW replace above with: The elected officers of the Guild shall be President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer. Volunteer and appointed positions shall be Demonstrations, Guild Equipment, Historian, Librarian, Newsletter Editor, Program Committee Chair, Public Relations, Refreshments, Samples, and Workshops.

All officers, whether elected, volunteer, or appointed shall hold one-year terms. All positions shall be filled by current members. Other than Treasurer, officers shall not be elected for more than two consecutive terms in the same position.

A nominating committee of at least two Guild members shall be appointed in August. Their slate of officers (delete: and board members) will be presented at the regular October meeting.

Elections shall be held at the regular November meeting. If there is more than one candidate for a position, there will be a vote by ballot.

Section II- The President shall preside at all Guild (delete: and board) meetings. S/he shall exercise general supervision over the Guild and shall perform generally all duties incidental to the office and such other duties as may be assigned from time to time.

The Vice President shall perform all duties of the President during his/her inability to act and shall have such other power as necessary. (delete: the Vice President's major duty will be the organization, correspondence and records of the guild programs.)

The Secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings and shall keep such records as may be required.

The Treasurer shall collect all dues and other moneys and shall pay all bills. S/he shall also keep an itemized account of all receipts and expenditures and present a (delete: written) report at each meeting.

The **Demonstrations** chairperson shall coordinate all community demonstrations.

The Guild Equipment chairperson shall house (add: and maintain an inventory of) Guild assets such as looms, spinning wheels, (add: other equipment and accessories).

The **Historian** shall keep a complete record and history of (delete: all things turned into the) Guild (add: activities).

The Librarian shall look after the Guild library, currently housed in the back of the Ginko Gallery in Oberlin, OH.

The Newsletter Editor shall construct and edit a monthly newsletter of coming events, general information and member news.

New: The **Public Relations** chairperson shall provide local newspapers with notices of meetings and special events.

New: The **Program Committee Chair** shall organize monthly programs for guild meetings,

The **Refreshments** chairperson shall coordinate and remind volunteers to provide refreshments for the monthly meetings.

The **Samples** chairperson shall solicit requests and collect and prepare samples for the *(delete: newsletter)* membership.

The **Sunshine** chairperson shall (delete: coordinate refreshments at the meetings and special occasions) provide for the well being of the membership.

Article IV - Membership

<u>Section I-</u> Membership in the Guild shall be open to all persons interested in the Mission Statement of the Guild. Each (add: currently

paid) member shall be entitled to one vote (add: and to stand for an officer's position).

Section II- The annual dues (Jan. 1 - Dec. 31) payable in advance shall be fixed by the membership. Dues shall be in a form of donation to the Guild and all members making a donation shall receive a copy of the newsletter.

2007 - Annual dues are \$20. For those wishing only to receive the newsletter, dues will be \$10. Should the (add: newsletter-only) member wish to participate in any paid classes/workshops, s/he will be expected to pay the remaining \$10 at that time. New: One address equals one membership.

Article V - Meetings

Section I- The monthly meeting of the Guild shall be held on the second Tuesday of the month. Notice shall be published in the Guild newsletter. Membership is not a prerequisite to attend our monthly meetings.

(Delete: Section II- The monthly board meetings will be determined by the Board. All Guild members are welcome to attend.) If approved then the Section I designation would also be deleted.

Article VI

The By-laws may be amended at any meeting, provided that written notice is given to each member of the Guild prior to such meeting.
