## A new technique

EGGY Strang will teach us pin tension knitting at our meeting July 11 at 7 p.m. at the Carlisle Visitor Center on Diagonal Road.

This technique will be new to most of us but is an excellent way to make your knitting stitches more even. This is truly wonderful for those of use who spin our own yarn and who want a more even appearance.

Peggy, who owns the French Creek Fiber Arts shop, is well known to many of us and offers many classes in fiber techniques.

## Dye workshop

Color will be the order of the day on guild dye day July 29 at Roni Rospert's home in Norwalk from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Bring up to 10 skeins of 50 yards each, washed, soaked, still damp and well tied and with tape labels marked with your name. Use only the

tape, not tags, so they don't tangle with other skeins.

We'll dip them into 4 pots: cochineal (red) madder (orange) mint (green) and a yellow. We'll have 4 dye pots and by using two different mordants we will be able to obtain two different shades of each color from the same pots.


We will also be experimenting with tie dyeing silk scarves, which should be washed carefully with soap and water and then soaked for 24 hours and brought wet to the dye pots.


Kay Griggs and Elizabeth Yasaki will have some large, 36-inch square scarves for sale at the July meeting. Those or any white silk is suitable to use.

Beth Hines said she will bring rubber bands for anyone who wants to try tie-dying the scarves.

If you plan to attend, bring rubber gloves, plastic bags and a bucket to take your dyed wool home in.

The lunch will be potluck, (that's always yummy!) so bring your dish and your own table service. Beverages will be provided.








## Basket workshop

#### Summer recipes

#### Pretzel/Jello salad

First layer: 2 cups crushed pretzels

3/4 cup melted butter

3 ½ tablespoons sugar

Mix together and press into 9x12 pan and bake at 400 degrees 7 minutes, only. Cool

Second layer: 8 oz. Cool Whip,

1 cup sugar

1 8oz. package of cream cheese.

Beat sugar and cheese well together, fold in Cool Whip. Spread over well cooled pretzel layer. Chill.

Third layer: 3 small packages frozen strawberries (8 oz.

3 small packages strawberry Jello

3 cups very hot water.

Dissolve Jello in water and mix strawberries in well. Let stand 20 minutes. Pour over Cream cheese layer and refrigerate.

Best if made a day ahead.

Remember, you will always know more than the people who come to watch. If you don't spin or weave, knit. If you can use some other interesting tool, bring that. Carders, spindles and lucets also attract attention. Some of today's children have never even seen knitting being done.

## Use your flicker

The flicker, which looks like a dog brush, is the most underused piece of spinning equipment. You could even use a dog brush, if you don't have a flicker. Put something thick on your left thigh (canvas, leather, a book). Grasp a few locks of fleece by the cut end and put your left hand on your left thigh with the fiber pointing towards your right thigh. Don't brush the fiber. FLICK it. Hold the flicker in your right hand and tap, tap, tap at the ends of the fiber until they fly apart. Then use your left hand to hold the opened up fiber and flick the cut ends of the fiber. You can then spin it. You can flick a bunch and put it in a basket, and then spin it.

Unlike carding, flicking does not create any noils. Unlike combing, flicking does not leave you with left over short bits. All the fiber is fluffed up and opened out.
