The dye garden—yes?

The proposal that the guild provide a Memorial Dye Garden at Mill Hollow Park has prompted serious discussion between Laura Bentz and Grant Wood of the Park staff.

The park, which is just south of Vermilion and is where Pioneer Days are held every September, would provide a 30 x 6 foot space outside the yellow house facing the barn on the other side of the sidewalk from the current perennial garden. The MetroParks will even

strip the sod and provide sandstone and soil to build raised beds there.

The major concern for the guild is whether we are serious enough to maintain the garden—planting, weeding, watering and labeling the dye plants.

Laura Bentz says we need the following:

- 1) Members to do the manual labor building/planting the garden, on a Saturday morning (May 13 or 20) or Sunday afternoon (May 14 or 21).
- 2) Members who can share some older manure from their sheep, alpaca or cows or other animals on the chosen workday. Don't need a ton but every bit will help those plants grow!
- 3) Most importantly, members willing to volunteer throughout the summer to help weed during the growing season.

Laura has suggested a sign-up calendar—one or two people or families each week during June, July and August. If the guild decides to do this we need a realistic idea of how many people are willing to share the labor.

A note from Huntington



Pat Holobaugh, sister-in-law of the late LOCO Guild member Laddie Rubright, has registered to complete a Breast Cancer 3-Day Walk in Michigan from August 11-13.

The group will walk 60 miles in 3 days (camping at night!) to help fund research to find a cure for breast cancer. Laddie died of a particularly aggressive form of the disease and Pat Holobaugh has committed to raising at least \$2,200 to benefit the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation (85% of net proceeds) and the National Philanthropic Trust Breast Cancer Fund (15% of net proceeds).

She said she will be proud to carry a small token or photograph with the name of everyone who supports her walk - to remind her of the family and friends who are supporting her effort.



Knitting a pink tank cozy in Denmark...

A combat tank which was used in World War II was the setting for this work of art. As a protest against the Danish (and also the USA and UK) involvement in the war in Iraq the tank was covered from the canon to the caterpillar tracks with knitted and crocheted squares made with pink yarn. The squares were knitted by many people from many European countries and USA. The process of covering the tank was documented with a video and this video was shown in "Nikolaj, Copenhagen Contemporary Art Center" (Copenhagen, Denmark) as part of the exhibition "TIME" from April 27 - June 4.

The pink covering consists of more than 3000 pink squares- 15 x 15 centimeters – knitted by volunteers from Denmark, the UK, USA and several other countries. People were invited through Cast Off Knitting Club, from friend to friend either by word of mouth or over the internet, and by a number of knitting groups made for this specific project, or other already existing knitting groups. There were 4-5 permanent volunteers who sewed the squares together to cover the tank and many of the people that passed by the exhibit also helped sew and crochet the pieces together.
